

## Message from the College Rabbi

## Rabbi Paul Lewin

In one of the strangest scenes in the Bible, Jacob wrestles an unknown assailant through a dark night.

The morning dawns, and the stranger asks to leave. Jacob responds by asking the stranger. Tell me your name. The stranger says why would you need to know my name?

The rabbis interpret the story as the ultimate question that Jacob is asking, "Explain to me, why you hate me, why do you hate the Jew?"

And the stranger responds, there is no answer to that question because I constantly change.

Rabbi Sacks masterfully described antisemitism as, "Antisemitism is not a unitary phenomenon, a coherent belief or ideology. Jews have been hated because they were rich and because they were poor; because they were capitalists and because they were communists; because they believed in tradition and because they were rootless cosmopolitans; because they kept to themselves and because they penetrated everywhere. Antisemitism is not a belief but a virus. The human body has an immensely sophisticated immune system which develops defences against viruses. It is penetrated, however, because viruses mutate. Antisemitism mutates.

And so the question is, how do we educate our children in the face of the rise of antisemitism?

Antisemitism is not a Jewish problem, but symptomatic of a wider societal illness, every single student in the college be they a Jew or not he's exposed to this hatred.

At Masada we have instilled within our students a pride in their Judaism. From daily prayers, to Hebrew and Jewish Studies, engagement with Jewish history and the festivals. To the incredible Pathways camps. From the very moment that the students start their day are afforded the opportunity to engage with Judaism and the vibrancy of Jewish Culture and traditions.

In spite of the haters, the Jews and the Jewish people have contributed in ways that far exceeds our numbers. It is with this in mind that the College endeavours to inspire students, equipping them to cope with whatever challenge the World might throw at them. To instill a sense of responsibility, to make the World a better place for all. This is our mission. Thank you for entrusting your children in our care.

## About Masada College

Masada College, founded in 1962, is a Jewish co-educational school from preschool to Year 12 on Sydney's North Shore. Students from all backgrounds are welcomed to Masada College, which prides itself on inclusivity. Every Masada College student is valued and nurtured to reach their full potential.

Taking inspiration from the Project Zero research team at Harvard University, Masada College has adopted a Culture of Thinking pedagogy. Through our Culture of Thinking, students develop critical thinking, problem-solving, improved decision making and a curiosity and love of learning.

We are very proud of our HSC results, consistently placing in the top schools in NSW. However, we are most proud of those students who exceeded their own expectations due to the individual attention they receive, our dedicated teachers, small class sizes and the collaboration of teachers and parents.

We are committed to providing our students with a strong foundation of Jewish education, and our students leave us with a strong understanding and pride in their Jewish identity.

We provide students with a wide range of co-curricular programs to extend student experiences and develop personal interests. In the Senior School, we also run co-curricular programs during school hours for Years 7 to 10, including Chinese, debating, drama and mock trials.

Masada College students have a growth mindset and are compassionate and globally-minded. Our Jewish values of kindness and respect are integrated into all aspects of school life, developing a positive mindset in each student.





## **Student Population**

Masada College 2024 - 363 students, of which 250 enrolled in Senior School and 113 in Junior School. The gender balance across the College was 66% male and 34% female. The College enrolled 38 overseas students - 68% of Years 7-12 and 32% of Years K-6. Most of our overseas students required some level of English as a Second Language (EAL/D), and for Years 11-12, we offered the NESA EAL/D English course. 50% of Masada College students have a language background other than English.

The College has students with additional needs supported by the Learning Support Team.

There are 0% Indigenous students. The College accepts students from both Jewish and non-Jewish backgrounds and a wide spread of ethnicities.

Should there be no notification from a student's parents by 11am, an SMS is sent to Senior School parents alerting them of the student's absence and requesting feedback and a call is made to Junior School parents.

#### Non Attendance

It is the policy of Masada College that an accurate record of daily attendance is maintained using the facility of an online attendance system. All parents, Early Learning to Year 12, are expected to support the College's rules.

#### **Advance Notification**

If parents know in advance that a child is going to be absent from school for any reason, they should notify the Head of the relevant school as soon as possible by completing the statutory request for leave forms. Parents may not take children on extended holidays in term time without permission. The Head of School will grant permission for such leave in exceptional circumstances. Students who are absent during exam/assessment periods will be issued with an estimated mark, and separate examinations will not be provided for them, except in extenuating circumstances.

#### Late Notes

These are only acceptable if the reasons given are legitimate ones. Excuses such as 'woke up late' or 'missed the bus' will not prevent the student from being disciplined and students will be expected to catch up on any work missed. Senior School Staff believe that students are old enough to take responsibility for their actions and that students should not seek their parents' help in defying school regulations.

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## **Enrolments**

### **Enrolment Policies**

Masada College is a comprehensive co-educational Jewish Day School that operates within the policies of the NESA. Masada College does not discriminate with regard to enrolments on the basis of gender, disability or special needs, however, the College may not be able to accommodate all children given the limitations of space, number, specialised facilities and special needs teachers. Enrolment is necessary for new students and students who are re-entering the College. Once students have enrolled, families are expected to support the College's ethos and abide by and respect the College's policies, procedures and rules to maintain their enrolment. Signing the Parent Agreement is part of the enrolment process.

#### **Enrolment Procedure**

The enrolment procedure is as follows:

- Return the completed and signed Application Form with the Application Fee and all supporting documentation
- Application Fee is \$200 for ELC students and is nonrefundable.
- Application Fee is \$200 for local students K-12 and is non-refundable.
- Application Fee is \$350 for International students K-12 and is non-refundable.
- Applications are dated from the receipt of a completed and signed Enrolment Form.
- Application Form and the accompanying fee along with required relevant documentation (ie birth certificate/passport / language test) is reviewed.

#### **Acceptance Fee**

A place at Masada College is accepted with the return of the completed Offer of Enrolment Form, accompanied by an Acceptance Fee payment of (\$1,000) for Local Students and (\$5,000 for international students. \$500 Bond is required to be paid to secure a place at the ELC.

Irrespective of the student commencing at the College the Acceptance Fee is non-refundable. For students applying from offshore, any offer of a place may be made after an online interview and is conditional pending satisfactory face-to-face interviews on arrival.

#### **Interviews**

Successful applicants will be invited to the next phase - an interview with the relevant Head of School for students new to the College are mandatory for students and their parents or guardians. EAL/D students or students who have studied in Australia for less than two years are required to provide evidence of an AEAS or an iDAT for years K-3 language test and satisfy a required standard.

Offers will be made the year prior to commencement. Applications for immediate enrolment will be made subject to availability. Where the College does not offer a place, the applicant's name will be placed on a waiting list. Places will be offered in strict order of receipt of the Application Form and Fee. First priority is given to Jewish students, second priority is given to siblings of students enrolled in the College and third priority is given to children of Masada graduates. Students whose first language is not English may be deemed necessary to sit for an English test and based on the results a place may be offered conditionally to completion of an intensive English program and EAL/D classes being attended on enrolment.

Note: Obtaining a place at Masada College is highly competitive. Applications can be rejected at any point in the enrolment process.

#### **Continued Enrolment**

Is dependent on the payment of fees and respecting the ethos, rules and expectations of the College.



# Summary of School Policies

### Access and Changes to Masada Policies

Some College policies can be accessed by students, parents, staff and the Board from the College website and The School Handbook, as appropriate to each audience. The full text of policies can also be obtained by contacting the office of the College Principal which are kept on a school server. Support and communication of policies and guidelines is provided to staff at staff meetings, new staff inductions and training sessions. Policy content directly relevant to students is published in the student diaries

### **Child Protection Policy**

Masada College aims to ensure a safe and supportive environment for all students as well as meeting its legislative obligations in relation to child protection. All staff are provided with a Staff Code of Conduct which outlines the legislative context of staff, their Duty of Care and their legal liability and provides general guidelines to ensure that Masada has a safe, supportive environment. Staff must also to complete annual child protection training.

The Child Protection document is intended to be provided and made available to staff including employees and contractors during their employment or engagement with Masada College to ensure a clear understanding of their duties and obligations under the key items of child protection legislation in NSW. This Policy outlines the key concepts and definitions under the relevant legislation including mandatory reporters, reportable conduct and risk management. It also sets out expected standards of behaviour in relation to employees and contractors and their relationships with students.

There are three key pieces of child protection legislation in New South Wales incorporated into this policy, namely:

the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 (NSW) (the Care and Protection Act) the Child Protection (Working With Children) Act 2012 (NSW) (the WWC Act); and the Ombudsman Act 1974 (NSW) (the Ombudsman Act).

All staff are expected to read this policy on an annual basis (along with any new employees starting throughout the course of a year) and sign off that they have read and understood the policy. Staff are also expected to complete the AIS Child Protection module on an annual basis.

There were some minor changes made to the Child Protection Policy that aligned to elements communicated and reflected upon from the Australian Independent Schools (AIS).

The Emergency Evacuation Plan was also updated in close consultation with the Communal Security Group (CSG). The Behaviour Management policy in the Junior School was also reviewed and updated to meet new requirements. There were no changes made to the Attendance Policy.

Masada policies continue to be reviewed on an annual basis.



# Stakeholder Satisfaction

As part of our commitment to continuous improvement, Masada College conducted comprehensive surveys with both parents and students in 2024. The feedback affirms the College's strengths in academic encouragement, community, and Jewish identity, while also providing valuable insights into areas for enhancement.

The 2024 Student Survey results reflect a generally positive experience for students at Masada College, particularly in areas related to personal growth, classroom learning, and the overall school environment.

A key highlight was the development of strong thinking skills, where 86% of students rated their experience as either Excellent or Satisfactory. Similarly, 79% of students felt that they had developed independence and responsibility to a high standard, with many acknowledging that their time at Masada had prepared them well for the transition to high school.

Students also rated their experience in General Studies highly, with 79% selecting Excellent or Satisfactory across subjects such as English, Maths, Science, HSIE, and the Arts. This affirms the strength of the academic program and the support provided in core curriculum areas.

The College's nurturing environment was another standout, with 79% of students reporting positive experiences in areas such as safety, friendships, and support from staff. Feedback in this area underscores the College's strong pastoral care framework and inclusive culture.

Camps and excursions emerged as a particular favourite among students, with 85% rating these experiences as Excellent or Satisfactory. This reflects the value students place on hands-on learning, teamwork, and opportunities beyond the classroom.

While sporting opportunities and carnivals received more mixed feedback, the majority of students still rated these experiences positively. These insights present opportunities to continue refining and expanding co-curricular offerings.

Overall, the results affirm that students at Masada College feel supported, challenged, and well-prepared—academically and personally—during their school journey.

The 2024 Parent Survey results reflect a strong endorsement of Masada College's educational environment, teaching quality, and values-based approach. Parents across both Junior and Senior School expressed high levels of satisfaction, with several key areas receiving over 80% positive ratings.

A standout result was in the area of student encouragement and support. 100% of Year 6 and Year 12 parents rated the extent to which their child was encouraged to reach their full potential as either Excellent or Satisfactory. This clearly affirms the College's commitment to fostering individual growth and academic confidence in students.

Parents also expressed overwhelming satisfaction with teaching staff, particularly in the Junior School. Across multiple attributes—quality of teaching, knowledge of students, helpfulness, reliability, and communication—more than 80% of responses fell into the Excellent or Satisfactory range. These results demonstrate a high level of trust in Masada's educators and the meaningful relationships they build with students.

The College's efforts in promoting Jewish identity and pride were also strongly affirmed. In the Senior School, 83% of Jewish parents rated their child's pride in being Jewish, and their connection to Israel, as strongly achieved. Similarly, in the Junior School, 100% of parents rated knowledge of chagim and the Jewish calendar as Excellent.

Parents described the school environment as warm, inclusive, and community-oriented. The majority felt that their child experienced a strong sense of belonging and positive relationships at school, with wellbeing and pastoral care emerging as strengths.


